Electrical and Computer: Mechanical and Materials:

:: "Microscopy and Spectroscopy Diagnosis Guided Design of Materials for Better Batteries," Presented by Dr. Chongmin Wang, Pacific Northwester Laboratory November 23rd @ 1:30pm via Zoom

Diagnosis based on microscopy and spectroscopy have been realized to be one of the essential approaches for gaining insights as how an electrode material failure, therefore feeding back for optimized designing and creating new materials with enhanced battery performances. In this presentation, I will focus on recent progress on ex-situ, in-situ, operando and cryo-scanning transmission electron microscopy studies for probing into the structural and chemical evolution of electrode materials for lithium ion batteries and beyond. I will highlight several recent key observations, which even appear to be well documented, while essentially are poorly understood, therefore limiting the advances of both cathode and anode for better batteries. It would be expected that this presentation can stimulate new ideas as how to attack these bottlenecks to advance the electrode materials design for better batteries.
