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

Outside Class

- Discuss responsibilities with the course supervisor;
- TAs are trained as researchers rather than teachers (DeCesare, 2003); hence the transition to accomplishing the TA responsibilities becomes a difficult task;
- Meet regularly with instructor for any clarification because he is a major source of support and information;
- Consult the instructor of the course about students requests;
- To feel confident you can attend class sessions to see the teaching style of the course instructor or observe your mentors or experienced TA;
- Identify effective teaching methods by observation;
- Do not be afraid to ask for advice from experienced person;
- Have plans and write them down;

Inside Class

- Dress like a teacher;
- Make eye contact;
- Being nervous is natural;
- Act confident even if you are not;

- Do not let students know it is your first time (be well prepared, talk and teach confidently);
- Do not be too much apologetic in your tone;

Inside Class

- Communicate with students learn their names (use name tags). It is great to greet everyone as individuals;
- Take your written plans to the class;
- Do not become friends or more with your students;
- Set the authority (do not be too comfortable with your students);
- No exceptions in rules;
- Don't make any comments that could be interpreted as offensive to someone's gender, race, culture, religious beliefs, sexual orientation, or other sensitive topics.

Introduce yourself

*Check if instructor will introduce you

- Your name and how you expect students to call you;
- Where you are from (optional);
- What your role in the classroom will be and your duties;
- How long you will working with the class;
- Other teaching assistant working with you and the shared work;
- Do not use humor that may cross the borderlines;
- Make it short

Icebreaker


- Ask them to introduce themselves and talk about the meaning and history of their names;
- Ask if they have studied this subject before;
- Ask what would they like to get out of this course;
- Ask if they can talk about examples related to the subject from the real world;




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
